BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE:

Jacob Strickler was born on November 24, 1770 in what was then known as the Massanutten section of Shenandoah County, Virginia. His family came from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania and settled in the Massanutten region around 1733. On July 3, 1819, Jacob married Anna Rothgeb and their only child Mary was born on January 8, 1822.

Jacob Strickler is known for his elaborate and beautiful frakturs. Judging by some of his frakturs, he was believed to be a Mennonite preacher or parochial-school leader. He was most probably a minister based on the sermon books found in his library.

Folder 8: *ABC Book* in German, printed in Shenandoah County, VA by Solomon Henkel, 1819 (very fragile)

Folder 9: *Selong Buch*, song book in German by Henrich Ludwig Bronner, 1795, inscribed on inside cover "William Armentrout, May 17, 1803" (very fragile)

Folder 10: *Special Conference of the Evangelical Lutheran Church* held at New Market, VA, October 4&5, 1807, in German (very fragile)

Folder 11: *Doctor Martin Luther's Shorter Catechism*, printed by Jacob D. Dietrick in Staunton, VA, 1808

Folder 12: The Christian Confession of the Faith of the harmless Christians in the Netherlands, known by the name of Mennonists, printed by Ambrose Henkel, New Market, VA, 1810 (very fragile)

Folder 13: Family bible published in Switzerland in 1536 (very damaged)

Folder 14: Picture of a hand-press with a stone bed made by Ambrose Henkel and used by him in his print shop which was established in New Market, VA in 1806. This press is now at Duke University, Durham, NC. Also photos of Rev. P. C. Henkel, Rev. Paul Henkel and wife, Ambrose Henkel
