

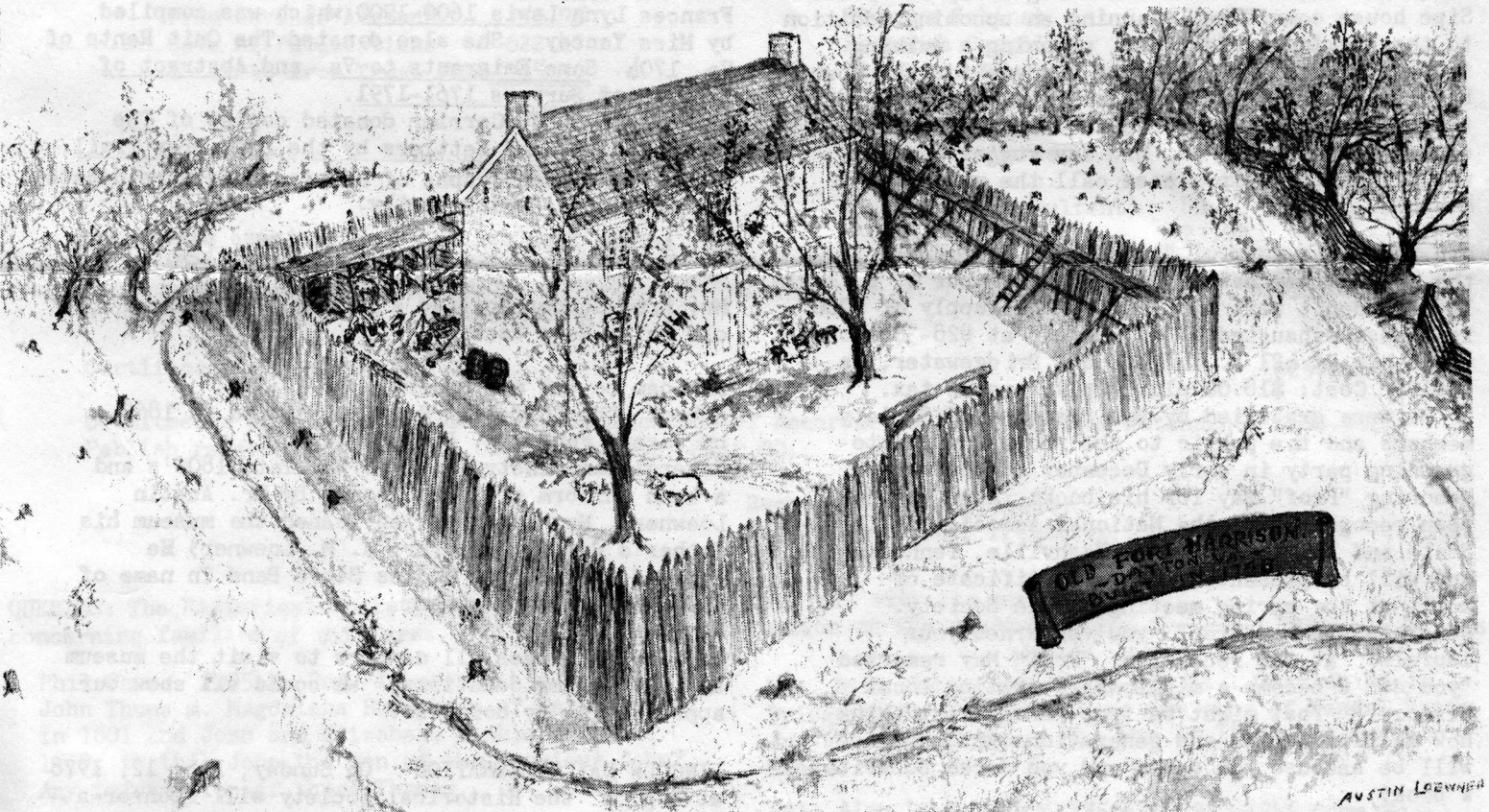

FT. HARRISON, in Dayton, Va., was built by Daniel Harrison (1701-1770) sometime between 1746 and 1749. He had come to the Shenandoah Valley from Delaware about 1738 with other members of his family, including his brother, Thomas, the founder of H'burg. Daniel Harrison developed numerous enterprises, chief among them farming. He was a very large landholder in the region. Altogether, he and his sons were granted some 4,294 acres of land between 1739 and 1766. His home plantation on Cook's Creek contained 1,129½ acres. Here, Harrison established a grist mill, a distillery, a general store and an ordinary. The Vestry of Augusta Parish authorized a "Chapel of Ease" at his plantation with Anglican services held initially in his house and later in a framed wooden chapel on his land. He seems to have done some building as well: he submitted the low bid to construct the Augusta Co. Court House but for unexplained reasons did not receive the contract.

The mid 1750's was a time of considerable danger for Valley residents because of the French and Indian Wars. Marauding bands of Indians frequently roamed the area, threatening the settlers. Daniel Harrison's solidly built house was a natural fort to which he added a stockade and an underground passage to the nearby spring; loopholes for firing rifles may have been set in the stone walls as well.

During these troubled years Harrison served in the Augusta Co. militia as Captain, a military

Fort Harrison is a beautifully situated structure on high ground above Cook's Creek. The front portion is the original Daniel Harrison house, built of stone but covered with stucco in more recent times. Originally, there were a number of out-buildings: in Daniel Harrison's will there is mention of the dwelling house, a storehouse kitchen and other structures. The brick extension on the back of the house probably dates to the early 1800's and other alterations such as the wider windows were made by the Solomon Burtner family after 1866.

After Col. Benjamin Harrison's death in 1819, his son, Dr. Peachy Randolph Harrison, sold the property to John Allebaugh in 1821. In 1856 the house was sold to J. N. Liggett, and 10 years later, in 1866, the Burtner's purchased it. In 1916, the property came to the ownership of the Koogler family.

DAYTON TOWN COUNCIL VOTES \$2500 TO FORT HARRISON:

During these troubled years Harrison served in the Augusta Co. militia as Captain, a military tradition carried on by his son, Benjamin (1741-1819), who inherited the house after his father's death. Benjamin's distinguished military career began in 1763 when he joined the Augusta militia. He commanded a company at the Battle of Point Pleasant in 1774. During the American Revolution, as a Colonel, he led troops against suspected Tories in what is now Hardy Co. West Va. and against hostile Indian tribes on General Lachland McIntosh's expedition further west, and he commanded a regiment at Yorktown.

After the Revolutionary war, Benjamin Harrison became a justice for the newly formed Rockingham Co. Court; indeed he supervised the building of the first court house in H'burg. He was also very active in the establishment of the Methodist Church in H'burg and was appointed to the first Board of Trustees by Bishop Asbury.

DAYTON TOWN COUNCIL VOTES \$2500 TO FORT HARRISON:

The Board of the Rockingham County Historical Society is negotiating the purchase of Fort Harrison in Dayton, Va., with the aim of stabilizing the structure, preventing further deterioration and its destruction. These researchers are provided through government CETA funds. Since the beginning of their jobs, John, Mary and Mike have been working diligently on indexing the court minute records, doing genealogical research, cataloguing artifacts in the museum, and filing loose photos. They have also been involved in formulating a report to the Sipe house committee, planning an upcoming addition to the Rockingham Recorder, planning a walking tour of H'burg and producing a movie for the county bicentennial. Prof. May is now engaged in research for a book on the life of Jed Hotchkiss. Hotchkiss, described by many as "a self-instructed genius" served as first principal of Mossy Creek Academy, was the foremost map maker of the Civil War, and pioneered the geological & industrial development of Va. and West Va during the reconstruction era. Let's encourage him in this undertaking.

THE OLD HOMES TOUR held last October, co-sponsored by the Society and the Extension Homemakers Clubs of Rockingham County was a tremendous success. While there is no known copy of the reply to the President, the activities on Feb. 12 in the Lincoln Cemetery will include a presentation of the information sought by the President.
